## **Communicating with Someone Experiencing Hearing Loss**

## Below are suggestions for communicating with someone who has experienced hearing loss:

O	Before beginning to speak, get the attention of the person with the hearing loss
O	Face the person and have the light on your face (in your eyes)
O	Speak up, as clearly and naturally as possible, without shouting
O	Do not overemphasize the speech sounds or talk in slow motion
O	Cut out background noise by turning off the TV or radio
O	Write down important information and directions
O	Don't cover your mouth with your hand or an object
O	Think about trimming a mustache and/or beard so lips are easier to read
O	Rephrase a misunderstood sentence rather than repeat it
O	Ask the person with the hearing loss to repeat vital facts
O	When traveling by car, look at the person who is speech reading to the degree safety allows
O	When going to a restaurant, choose a quiet, well-lit establishment where the noise is tolerable
0	Ask for a table away from music speakers and in a corner, so the person with a hearing loss can sit against the wall to minimize background noise
0	When in a group, clue the person into the conversation, the punchline, the context, and/or assist the person when topics change

## If the listener does not understand you:

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0	Repeat what you said
0	Slow down
0	Speak slightly louder than normal
0	Re-word or re-phrase (say it another way using common words)
0	Present sentences in short units, breaking them down into "chunks" ("I went on a tripwith my daughter's classto Ellis Island")
0	Request feedback ("Tell me what you understood.")
0	Write down some important words
